- 1972- Pittsburgh National Organization of Women establishes PAAR in response to a series of rapes.
- 1974-Incorpoarates as a 501-c-3 organization providing sexual assault hotline services, medical/legal advocacy and victim services.
- 1979-Counseling services offered to child victims and their families.
- 1991-PAAR moves from it small Oakland office into a large historic structure that was a Baptist Church.
- 2011-PAAR's Executive Director, Alison Hall receives national recognition for her leadership role in helping to establish the first Sex Offender Court in PA

Objectives

Women in drug and alcohol recovery:

- 75% of women in treatment programs for drug and alcohol abuse report having been sexually abused. Najavits, L. Weiss, R., and Shaw, S. (1997)
- Nearly 90 % of alcoholic women were sexually abused as children or suffered severe violence at the hand of a parent.

Women sex workers

- A study found that the incidence of non consensual pubertal sex in women sex workers was 32% while in their control group was 13%. Pottera, J., Rothenberg, R., Muth, S., Darrow, W. & Phillips-Plummer, L (2010).
- About 80% of sex workers are raped by clients. They are raped on average 8 to 10 times per year. National Institute of Justice and Center for Disease Control and Prevention. (1998).
- A San Francisco study found in a sample of 130 sex workers that 57% had a history of childhood sexual abuse, and they were victimized on average by 3 different perpetrators. Hunter S. Reed K (1990).



Latino/ Hispanic undocumented immigrant women

- A study conducted among school aged immigrant girls found immigrant girls are almost twice as likely as their non-immigrant peers to have experience incidents of sexual assault. Decker, M., Raj, A. and Silverman, J.,(2007).
- Immigrant girls and women of undocumented status are afraid of reporting sexual abuse to law enforcement. Dutton, M.A. Hass. G.A., and Ammar, N. (2003)
- Local Pittsburgh agencies working with undocumented Latinas have reported a high rate of intimate partner violence.



Latino/Hispanic undocumented immigrant women

- A study found that intimate partner and marital rape accounted for approximately 25% of rapes. Women are victimized around 20 or more times before the violence ends. Kennedy-Berger R.K (1996)
- Many undocumented Latinas hold conventional values and often view sex as a marital obligation which make them less likely to identify an experience as sexual assault or rape.



What is experiential psycho-education?

- Based on experience / Hands on.
- Use a wide range of learning activities.





Our goals:

- Learn relevant topics associated with the psychological difficulties that women who have been sexually abused may endure.
- Create the ground work for disclosure of sexual abuse by building trust and fostering safety.
- Create and maintain a partnership and close collaboration with community agencies serving vulnerable populations.
- Increase the likelihood of survivors seeking help.



How the program is presented


Creating a puzzle piece(Who are you ?)








